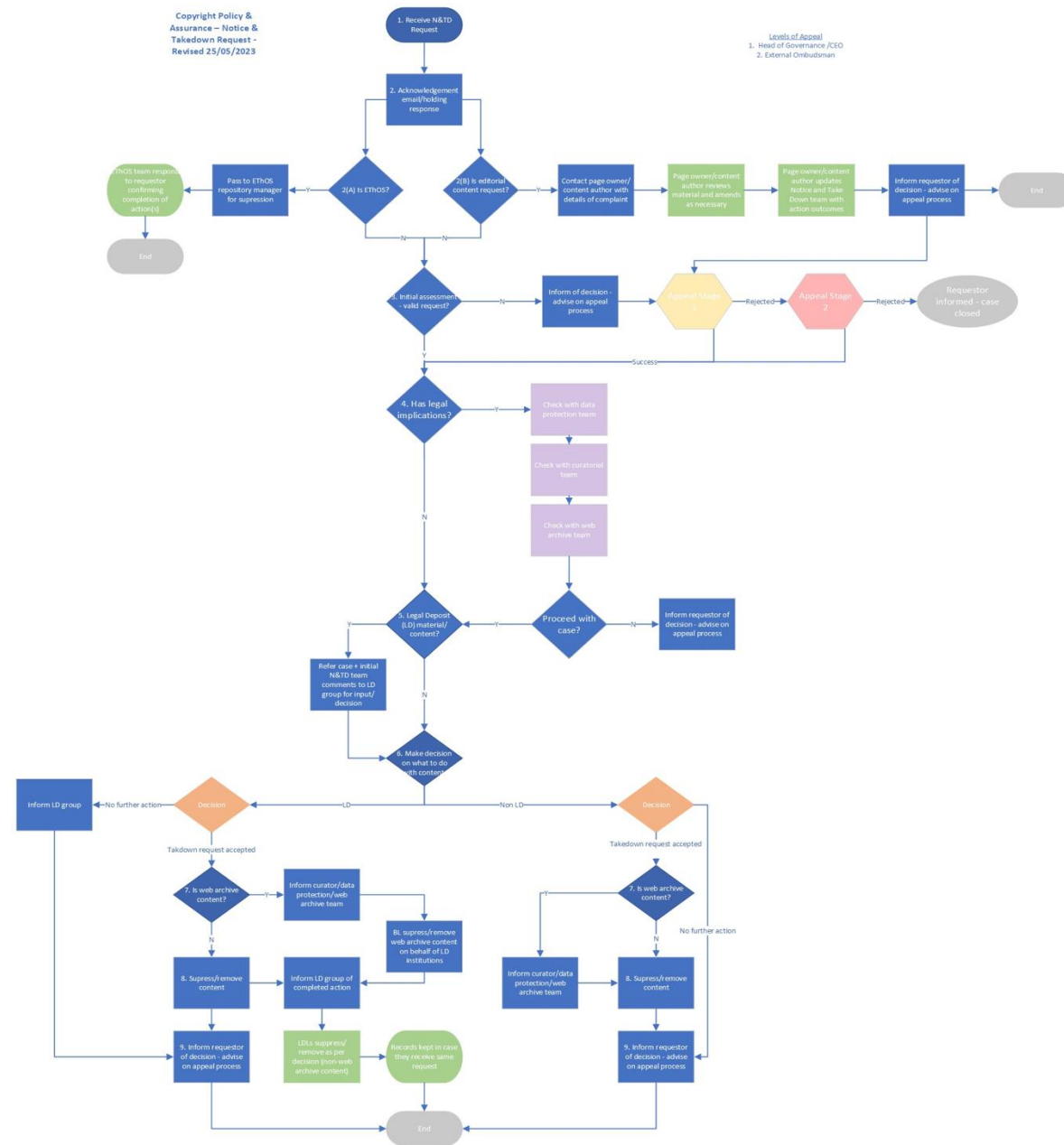

Notice and Take Down at the British Library

- Notice and Take Down at British Library is unusually complex
- Vast collection - approx. 170 million items and growing
- And we make use of it...heavily
- All great stuff, and everyone stands to benefit, but...
- Complex collection + widespread and varied use = opportunity for infringement!

The Process:

1. Audit – assess the condition of the existing process
2. Pinpoint gaps – are all activities accounted for within the process, what's missing?
3. Regenerate – fill gaps, bring relevant stakeholders into the investigation process, overhaul appeals mechanism
4. “Hearts and Minds” – internally publicise existence of revised process ensuring requests are dealt with through the proper channels.



Risks Managed:

- Provides a practical steer on what to do when things go wrong
- Sorts the "wheat from the chaff" - catch spurious or erroneous claims early on
- Impression forming – shows accountability, transparency and professional approach, reduces the risk of escalation
- Creates redundancy
- Ensures claims are handled via the proper channels.
